Regional Sidewalk Inventory

YVCOG is preparing to conduct a regional sidewalk inventory to identify key sidewalk projects that can be prioritized for funding. The inventory will focus on smaller jurisdictions in Yakima County, cataloging the location and condition of sidewalks and identifying missing links. Once inventoried, sidewalk projects could be prioritized for targeted funding based on an agreed-upon set of criteria.

We are now in the early stages of creating a process to conduct the inventory using existing GIS resources and researching criteria for prioritizing projects to address deficiencies. We need your help! Local knowledge of walking routes, existing sidewalks, missing links and community needs are things that local residents will be the most knowledgeable about. Local officials know where they get complaints, and maintenance crews are the local experts regarding sidewalk conditions and factors that could play a role in prioritization.



Please keep an eye out for future buzz regarding the sidewalk inventory and ways that you can be involved.

Nine Cities and Yakima County Receive a Share of Over \$20 Million Dollars

Congratulations to Yakima County, the Town of Naches, and the Cities of Zillah, Toppenish, Union Gap, Sunnyside, Selah, Grandview, Yakima, and Moxee for successfully securing additional Surface Transportation Programs (STP) funds. In December, the MPO/RTPO Executive Committee approved \$20,175,990 of Regional STP funds to fully complete projects identified as regional priorities in 2010 and 2012.

New SEPA Rules Allow More Flexibility

At the direction of the 2012 Legislature, the Department of Ecology has been updating State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) rules to streamline regulatory processes while maintaining environmental protection. The first round of rulemaking is complete with the new rules effective as of January 28, 2013.

The most significant changes relate to "flexible thresholds." SEPA sets a threshold for size of development, above which all projects are subject to SEPA, and below which projects are exempt. However, cities may raise this threshold by ordinance, up to a maximum established in the SEPA rules. A higher threshold means more projects are exempt. This is called a "flexible threshold" because cities have the flexibility in what threshold they want to adopt. The new rules raise the maximum thresholds up to: 30 units for single-family residential; 60 units for multifamily; 40,000 square feet for barns and farm equipment storage; 30,000 square feet and 90 parking spaces for office, school, commercial, recreational, and storage; and 1,000 cubic yards for landfill or excavation.

Guaranteed Ride Home to the Rescue!

I hate to imagine how often this scenario takes place. The carpool/vanpool is loading up for the ride home and poor old Bob runs out and announces, "The boss just told me I have to work overtime; how will I get home?" Or Barbara, who religiously rides the bus to work, is informed that her daughter had to come home from school early because she is sick and mommy needs to be home with her. Unfortunately Barbara has no idea how she will get home.

The solution? The Guaranteed Ride Home (GRH) program. The GRH program ensures that employees affected by the Commute Trip Reduction (CTR) program that use an alternative to drive alone such as carpool/vanpool, public transit, walking or bicycling are covered in an emergency. The CTR program at YVCOG funds the GRH program.

Surveys indicate that employees rank GRH as the most important influencing factor in their choice to participate in using a commute alternative. Ironically, GRH is rarely, if ever used, yet it is considered an important safety net that allows a comfort zone for those participating in the CTR program. This is a reminder to all of our Employee Transportation Coordinators (ETCs): make your employees aware of this **opportunity** (gosh, I love that word). Posters, brochures, informational flyers, and ride vouchers for the program have been distributed to your worksites. If you are an ETC and you need more vouchers or additional information about GRH, call me, e-mail me, and hound me.

GRH encourages your employees to use commute alternatives at no cost. So the next time an employee says "Now, how am I going to get home?", you can respond, "Not to worry, Guaranteed Ride Home to the rescue."



Parks and Economic Development Funding

Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) grants are available for parks, trails, and recreational facilities biennially, and applications will be accepted approximately **February to May, 2014**. These grants require jurisdictions to adopt an RCO-approved parks and recreation plan by March 3, 2014 to apply for funds in the next call for projects. If your jurisdiction has a parks and recreation plan update or development in the cards, now is the time to move it forward if you would like to apply for RCO funds in 2014.
